Here are the scripts for two versions of the Audio Introduction for Cub.

Numbers in brackets in the Easy Listen script are to help you locate the same information in the General Listen script, for comparison.

Easy Listen	General Listen
Hello, and welcome! Let's get ready for Cub, an exciting story about a child and a fox. It's a story you will listen to later. The Cub story helps us think about a question - How big is our family, really?	Hello, and welcome to this introduction to Cub, a story by Carbon Theatre, created with children from Cottesmore Academy.A storm is coming and the waters are rising. What will happen to the home where Kit, Mum and Nai Nai live? What about the fox and her cubs?
I'm talking to you to help you get ready to listen to the story.	This audio introduction is to get you ready for listening to Cub. We've built a special installation to help you really get into the story. An installation is something special to experience, created to fit a particular space, that won't be there for very long. At our installation, you can enter a place where part of the story happens, even before you start to listen to the story.
In the story, things happen on different days and in different places. The sounds in the story change when the place changes. When something happens outside, you hear wind or water or someone walking. When something happens inside, it's quieter. When the Dad in the story is talking, you know from his voice that he is on the phone and far away. Some of the sounds don't show a place. They are like music and they give us a feeling.	And when you listen in between the actual words you hear, the sounds in the story will give you lots of information; and the music will help you feel different feelings.
Cub is a special story because you can go to one of the places in it! Part of the story happens in a school. Inside the school, a child called Kit makes a den. Let me tell you about the place you can go.	Let me tell you about the installation.
You go into a big space. A lot of the floor is covered with colourful hanging cloths and home-made tents. They are quite low, and wonky; different shapes and sizes. There is a big soft wall made of cloths around a middle area. You can walk around the outside of this soft wall. If you go into the middle area inside the wall, you find the start of a short tunnel. The tunnel is made of more furniture and cloths. This is the way in to Kit's den.	In a big space, a lot of the floor is taken up by colourful hanging cloths and home-made tents. It all looks higgledy-piggledy, with different heights, patterns and textures. Pieces of fabric are hung over items of furniture. There's a bookcase, big enough to be used as a room divider in a library, with lots of square compartments. You can look right through the squares from one side to the other. The bookcase is draped with camouflage fabric like army nets. There are frames, including a loom for weaving, and a lot of free-standing black poles. Together, a lot of these structures form an enclosure. You can walk around outside the enclosure. But there's a gap in this fabric wall. You find the enclosure is hiding something else; a short tunnel, also built from furniture and cloths. And this tunnel is the way in, to Kit's den.
From the outside you can't tell what's holding up the cloths. But when you go inside the tunnel to the den, you find there are plastic chairs and tables, and tall black poles, holding up lots of different beautiful cloths. The cloths make the soft walls of the den, and a soft roof over your head.	From the outside you can't tell what's holding up the cloths. The cloths are really meant to do other things. They should be tablecloths, or tea towels in a kitchen, or quilts on a bed, or something to wear. Some of the cloths are meant for soldiers to hide behind. But in our story Kit has used them to make this den.	
The cloths are from all over the world.	Look out for different fabrics from all over the world in Kit's den.

can feel bumpy lines of stitches. It's made of different pieces of material joined together, with different colours and flowery patterns next to each other. One of the cloths on the floor is a rug, from a country called Mexico. The rug is	touch a Kantha quilt you can feel stitches running in lines across it, holding two layers of material together. And you can tell there are lots of small pieces of material put side-by-side to make one big piece. The pieces have different patterns and colours. Some of them are flowery. One of the textiles on the floor is a Mexican rug - woven in bands of grey,

	Maybe you'll come across a Cypriot linen tablecloth, which is white with blue flowers appliqued on it, and cut-out designs across the middle and at the hem.
